Government Tax on Checks NOW IN EFFECT

U. S. A. Revenue Act, 1932, Part VI-Section 751. Tax on Checks, Etc.:

(a) There is hereby imposed a tax of 2 cents upon each of the following instruments, presentd for payment on or after the 15th day after the date of the enactment of this Act and before July 1st, 1934: Checks, drafts, or orders for the payment of money, drawn upon any bank, banker, or trust company; such tax to be paid by the maker or drawer.
