

HOUSE DEFEATS REPEAL ISSUE

Dim Prospects of Further Prohibition Repeal Action This Term

Washington, Dec. 5.—In a heavily-guarded Capitol, the Seventy-Second Congress began its concluding session today with a turbulent House contest that abruptly ended Speaker Garner's hurry-up drive for prohibition repeal. The precedent-smashing move of

the silver-haired Speaker for an opening day rejection of national prohibition ended in an uproar that echoed outside, where bluecoats lined the plaza to ward off demonstrators. The bold and unprecedented attempt by the Democratic leadership to force its party's outright prohibition repeal proposal through the House failed and dimmed prospects of further action on the issue in that branch during the remainder of the short session. The action was interpreted on Capitol Hill as foreshadowing a special session of the new Congress next

spring soon after President-elect Roosevelt is inaugurated so that the Democrats may carry out their pledge for flat repeal. Despite the defeat of the resolution by the narrow margin of 272 to 144—two-thirds majority being required for adoption—the Democrats planned immediate attack on the problem of modifying the Volstead law. Eighty-one "lame-duck" members, not returned to the next Congress, and 83 Democrats re-elected in November, voted against the measure. Sixty-nine defeated incumbents voted for it. A shift of six votes from the negative to the affirmative would have sent the resolution to the senate. It was the first test in Congress on flat repeal of the 18th amendment since it was voted into the constitution in 1917. Had the measure passed, it would have been necessary for three-fourths of the states to ratify the change before the change could have been effected.

FAVOR ORDERLY SALE PEANUTS

As the general aim of the movement was understood at the meeting Monday, the central committee will handle the sales policy, provided the agreement proposed is supported by a sufficient number of growers. However, regrettable it might be, there are a number of farmers who have no control over their peanuts. In other words, there are papers against them and their crop, in those cases known as "distressed peanuts." These farmers will be permitted to sell first the percentage necessary to life the mortgage or debt. Those who are in a position to do will be asked to hold their peanuts until better prices prevail. However, there will be no contracts to sign for the plan is advanced on a strictly honorable basis. Yet every man will be expected to stand by his word.

The meeting went on record as favoring some plan that would increase the price of farmers' peanuts. A resolution was also passed by unanimous vote, requesting all farmers to keep their peanuts at home until sold. Delivery to market before the peanuts are sold is understood to be one of the surest ways to depress the market. Early next week, the central committee members from all over the belt are scheduled to meet with the cleaners, and Martin farmers will have to hustle if they are to perfect their plans and get representation at that meeting. Remember the meeting Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock and be at the courthouse when the first action is taken.
