SERVES FARMERS

Raleigh.-How the South's 11 cotoperatives with their membership of 240,000 are serving the farmer is described by U. Benton Blalock, president of the American Cotton Cooperative Association, in one of the featured articles in the current issue of Extension Service Review, magazine issued bi-monthly in Washington by the extension service of the department of agriculture.

In his 1500-word article Mr. Blalock points out that the cooperatives, which handled 2.000,000 bales of cotton last season, have "forced the cotton trade to a new peak of efficiency and a new low margin of profit" and in so doing have rendered a service to the nonmember as well as the member.

He also tells of the classing service the cooperatives render members, cites the reduction in operating expenses, and points out that the cooperatives are "not merely buying and selling of Cabarrus County produced 24 bales agencies but render protective services as well."

TELLSHOW CO-OP Postmaster Gives Rules for **Mailing Christmas Greetings**

Postmaster Jesse T. Price this week made public the following bulletin from the Post Office Department relative to the mailing of Christmas greeting cards this year:

"Printed greeting cards mailed under cover of unsealed envelopes are chargeable with postage at the third-class rate of 1 1-2 cents for each two ounces or fraction of two ounces regardless of whether addressed for delivery through postoffice boxes or general delivery, or by city or rural carrier; the 1-cent drop letter rate applicable at nonletter carrier offices does not apply to such cards in unsealed en sealed envelopes.

"Printed Christmas and other greeting cards in unsealed envel-

sealed, bearing written messages other than the simple inscriptions above mentioned, as well as all cards sent in sealed envelopes, are chargeable with postage at the first-class rate of 3 cents an ounce or fraction of an ounce, except when the 1-cent drop letter rate
