REPORT OF GRAND JURY

North Carolina, Martin County. In the Superior Court June Term, 1933

To the Honorable R. Hunt Parker, Judge Presiding:

We, the Grand Jury, beg leave to make the following report:

We have passed on all bills presented to us for indictment.

We have examined the County Home and County Jail and find same clean and in good condition, with exception of a few bricks being torn out and window glass out in the jail. This should be repaired. The inmates of both express satisfactory treatment. We have inspected all the school buildings in the county. There are several that need repairs at once. We have visited the offices of the Clerk Superior Court, Register of Deeds and Sheriff and find all in good condition, with the exception that a new floor covering is needed in the hall.

We have inspected all the school trucks stored in the Farmers Warehouse for repair. We found 40 school buses, one service truck, one regular truck. We find the county carries \$15,000.00 fire insurance on these trucks and buses, which, in our opinion, is sufficient.

We have not received reports from the following Justice of the Peace of the County: A. Corey, W. T. Meadows, J. A. Davenport, C. M. Hurst.

We have examined the books of the Treasurer of Martin County and find the following deposits made as of June 1st, 1933:

Branch Banking and Trust Co., Williamston, N. C., \$22,154.65. This deposit is secured by bond of \$15,000.00 Maryland Casualty Company, \$15,000.00 U. S. 4th 4 1-2 Liberty Loan Bonds;

Bank of Robersonville, Robersonville, N. C., \$24,533.55, secured by \$5,000.00 4 per cent N. C. Highway Bonds; \$10,000.00 4 1-4 per cent N. C. Highway Bonds; \$9,000.00 Fourth 4 1-4 Liberton Loan Bonds.

We have examined the sinking funds of Martin County in the amount of \$27,793.75 as of June 30, 1933. The following loans have been made, secured by first mortgage on real estate in Martin County:

The W. L. Stalls deed of trust has been foreclosed and the property was bought in by the county. We find that the county has approximately \$2,750 in this property.

We find that the fire insurance carried on the property is not sufficient and recommend it be increased, and the policies be placed with the deeds of trust on the following loans:

W. C. Manning to be increased from \$1,700.00 to \$3,500.00. Edward James from \$1,500.00 to \$2,500.00. W. L. Stalls property \$1,000.00 to \$2,000.00.

We did not find insurance policies on the buildings on property covered by George Gardner and J. G. and A. P. Barnhill deeds of trust. We recommend these buildings be insured at once with mortgage clause attached payable to Martin County.

We find there is a considerable amount of past due interest due on most of these loans. We recommend that the borrowers be notified at once that these deeds of trust will be foreclosed unless all past due interest and taxes are paid on or before December 1st, 1933. An effort should be made to get these notes in shape as soon as possible.

We have examined the guardian books of Martin County and find all guardian accounts in good shape except the following:

Alice Harris, guardian for Harris children. Funds deposited in Peoples Bank, Williamston, N. C., and First National Bank, of Washington, N. C. Banks have closed and are being liquidated. Report shows she is indebted to wards in amount of \$3,611.04. No assets on hand now.

Olivia E. Council for Charlie B. Council report funds not properly invested and no assets on hand, according to her report, due ward \$4,234.00.

George R. Roebuck, guardian for Roebuck children. We find no record of an account being filed.

D. L. Brown, guardian for Brown children. Report filed shows he is indebted to wards in the amount of \$3,034.08. Bond was given February 18, 1918, and we can find no record of its being renewed. No record as to how these funds are invested.

J. S. Peel, guardian of Annie Satterwhite. Records show he is indebted to ward in amount of \$1,286.38 and funds invested in \$4,000 Lenoir County N. C. Bond.

W. M. Highsmith, guardian of Highsmith children. Account filed shows he is indebted to wards in amount of \$427.56. No record how these funds are invested.

George W. Taylor, guardian of Moore children. Report filed shows wards due \$607.96. Bond renewed. Funds are secured by note secured by deed of trust E. L. and Nora Taylor. The records show this to be a second mortgage subject to a mortgage of \$1,900.00 on 90 acres of farm land. Funds not properly invested.

B. M. Worsley, guardian of Thomas children. Report filed shows ward due \$3,182.67. Bond has been renewed. These funds are secured by ten shares Oak City Supply Co. stock, \$2,000.00 notes secured by deed of trust H. S. Everett and B. M. Worsley on sixty acres farm land known as "Whitfield place." This deed of trust is a first lien. Part of funds not properly invested.

B. M. Worsley, guardian of Williams children. Report filed shows wards due \$492.03. Bond has been renewed. These funds are secured by \$100.00 note secured by deed of trust H. P. and Sue Parker on house and lot in Oak City. This deed of trust is a first lien on this property. \$400 note P. A. Moore and T. H. Johnson, dated November 26, 1919, due on demand. This note is not secured. Part of these funds not properly invested.

E. M. Long, guardian of Long children. Account filed shows wards due \$4,997.36. Bond renewed. These funds are secured by \$2,000 notes secured by deed of trust on Hamilton Telephone Co. property and drug store in Hamilton, N. C. This is a first lien on this property. \$950.00 note H. S. and W. Robert Everett, dated June 15, 1927, and due January 1, 1927. Interest paid to January 1, 1930. Not secured. \$1,000 note secured by second mortgage J. T. Bennett and wife, dated 2-20-26, due 12-1-26, with interest paid to 1-1-30. \$1,500.00 note secured by deed of trust N. M. Hyman and wife, dated 1-1-27, due 1-1-28, interest paid to 11-20-29. This is a second lien on this property. Part of funds not properly invested.

Mrs. Nettie Harrison, guardian of Harrison children. Account filed shows wards due \$1,112.36. The records show these funds were invested as follows: Loan to Dennis Bailey and A. W. Bailey \$800.00. Both makers went in bankruptcy and funds lost, as she has no security. Loaned W. R. Cratt \$450.00 on crop lien and chattel mortgage and lost about \$100.00. No assets on hand.

Thad Savage, guardian of Savage children. No account filed. Has deed of trust for \$300 on real estate, but property sold under prior deed of trust. Owes ward about \$309.00. No assets on hand to pay.

The sheriff was unable to locate these guardians to serve summons.

We recommend that Clerk of the Court and the Solicitor of the District proceed at once to have the above-mentioned guardians' accounts put in proper shape.
