PITT FARMER IS ROBBED OF \$4,000
Held Up By Three White Men Near Chocowinity Monday Night

Greenville, Oct. 10.—R. H. Tripp, farmer residing several miles north of Greenville, was robbed of \$4,000 when he was held up by three unidentified white men on the Greenville-Aurora highway, a short distance from Chocowinity last night, Sheriff Sam Whitehurst reported today.

Although a search was started for the bandits, no information leading to their apprehension had been obtained today.

Tripp told Sheriff Whitehurst he was driving along the highway between Aurora and Chocowinity when a car drew up behind and one of the occupants began firing upon him with a shotgun.

One load penetrated the side of Tripp's machine and he immediately stopped. Three men left the other car, and demanded that he turn over all of the money he had in his possession. Tripp handed over the \$4,000 he carried in a wallet.

The shotgun charge passed through the side of Tripp's machine, missing his head by a narrow margin, but he was uninjured. He said he did not recognize the men but knew they were white.

Tripp was returning from a visit to his sister in the Aurora community. The holdup occurred about 9 o'clock and officers started an investigation a short time later.

Tripp is said to have gone to Washington to put the money on deposit, but the bank had closed and he then decided to visit his sister with the money on person.

MAN ROBBED LAST MONDAY
Oak City Colored Farmer Gets Drunk and Loses Tobacco Money

Robersonville, N. C., October 12.—Leroy Lanier, colored farmer of the Oak City section, was said to have been robbed of about \$108 here last Monday morning when he got drunk and put himself on the mercy of the world. James Henry Brown and Thomas Perkins, local colored men, are being held in connection with the alleged robbery for a hearing before Mayor C. M. Hurst.

After selling a quantity of tobacco on the local market Monday morning, Lanier said he accompanied a friend to the colored section of the town, known as New Town, to get a drink. The first called for a second, and so on until the man "passed out."

Officers were notified and they jailed Lanier. Tuesday morning the farmer sobered up to find his \$108 missing. According to Lanier, Brown and Perkins assisted by one or two colored women got him drunk, and then the money disappeared.

William Bell, local colored man, was given a preliminary hearing by Mayor C. M. Hurst here last Monday morning for the alleged driving of an automobile while intoxicated. In default of bond, the man was jailed at Williamston to await trial in the county recorder's court there next Tuesday.

WORK ON WIDER ROAD UNDERWAY
Robersonville-Stokes Road Being Made 40 Feet Wide by Convicts

(Robersonville Herald)
Work on widening Highway No. 903 from Robersonville to Stokes is now under way, activities now being centered on that part of the road in Pitt County. State convicts are clearing a 40-foot right of way, and a few buildings are being moved out of the way, including some of those on the Asa Congleton place.

While only a few minor changes will be made in the roadbed on the Stokes end of the route, it is understood that the course will deviate from the present road in several instances on this end. The improvements will eliminate a number of short curves on this end of the route and cut down the distance between here and Stokes to some extent.

TARBORO MAN IS KILLED MONDAY NIGHT BY AUTO
Salesman For Cox Motor Company Driver of Car In Accident Monday

Louis Phipps, white, was killed, and his wife was injured in front of their home in Tarboro early Monday night when they were struck by an automobile driven by T. T. Cox, salesman for the Cox Motor Company, of Robersonville.

Cox, painfully but not seriously injured, was treated at a Tarboro hospital and later placed in jail, where a charge of manslaughter was preferred against him. The automobile, belonging to the Cox Motor Company and used as a demonstrator, was wrecked.

Phipps, about 33 years old, was working on a track just off the highway in front of their home a few hundred yards this side of the Tar River bridge. His wife was holding a lantern to furnish him light that he might complete the repair work started on the truck earlier in the day. Cox, said to have been drinking, rounded the last curve going into Tarboro so rapidly that he was unable to hold the car. Phipps died almost instantly, according to reports reaching here.

The lower part of Phipps' jaw was torn away and a leg was broken. He also suffered internal injuries. Mrs. Phipps suffered a broken limb, but her injuries are not considered serious.

According to reports reaching here, the car, after striking Phipps and his wife, struck a telephone pole and carried a portion of it 93 feet up the road.

At a hearing held in Tarboro on Wednesday morning, Cox was placed under a \$2,000 bond.

Cox and his family, residents of Robersonville during the past two or three weeks, are not related to the owner of the motor company, and the driver of the death car is not interested in the business other than as salesman before the accident.

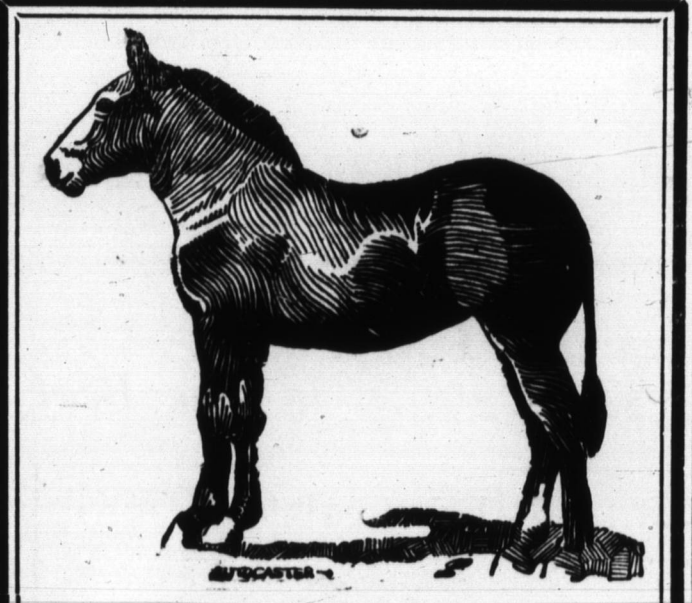
