Civil Service Commission Announces Examinations

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations as follows: Junior graduate nurse, \$1,620 a year, various services throughout the United States.

Teacher of home economics, senior high school, \$2,000 a year; teacher of home economics, reservation and junior high school, \$1,860 a year. Indian Service, Department of the Interior.

Senior stenographer, \$1,620 a year; junior stenographer, \$1,440 a year; senior typist, \$1,440 a year; junior typist, \$1,260 a year, departmental and field services.

All salaries given above are subject to a retirement deduction not to exceed 15 per cent as a measure of economy and to a retirement deduction of 3 1/2 per cent. Full information may be obtained from the secretary of the United States Civil Service Board of Examiners, at the post office here.
