\$4730 Is Being Paid Out To **103 Martin Farmers** This Week

Approximately \$4,730 is being distributed to 103 Martin County farmers who cooperated in the cotton reduction drive last year under the optional plan, it was learned yesterday from Miss Mary Carstarphen, secretary to County Agent T. B., Brandon. About 100 additional checks are expected within the next few days, and they will be delivered just as soon as they are received, provided the owners have signed contracts for controlling acreage this year.

Comparatively small poultry loadings were reported at Jamesville on Wednesday and here yesterday by the cooperativ poultry car, County Agent T. B. Brandon said this morning. Jamesville loaded 1,177 pounds for \$110.87, and Williamstn sold 5,254 pounds for \$550.45, making a total at the two points of 6,431 pounds and \$661.22 in receipts. Hucksters took more than 1,000 pounds of hens from the car here, it was estimated.

While there is a marked decrease of hickens in the county this year as compared with the number of last year, the light loadings this week were the result of comparatively low prices, it is believed.


