Brooder Temperature Should Be Regulated
 Any artificial brooding requires the same temperature for baby chicks. For the first week the brooder should be regulated to 98 degrees at the outer edge of the canopy on the level with the chick's head. The temperature should be reduced 5 degrees each week for 6 weeks. In cold weather the temperature, should be checked at frequent intervals. If this schedule is followed carefully, it will reduce crowding and a larger number of healthy chicks will be raised.

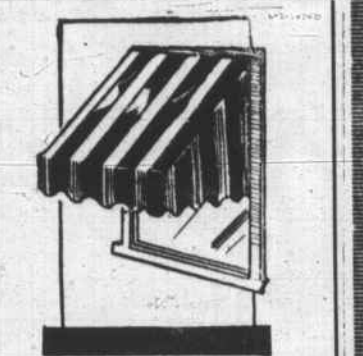
