TELLS FARMERS AVOID TROUBLE

List of Reminders About Cotton and Tobacco Contracts

T. B. Brandon, Martin County farm agent, recently issued a list of reminders to farmers who signed cotton and tobacco contracts, stating "there are a few things that signers obligated themselves to do, and I want to call them to their attention."

Failure to observe provisions of the contracts may result in difficulties with the government, Mr. Brandon warned.

The list follows:

- "1. Measure and plant your allotted acres.
- "2. Measure and post your rented acres, remembering that the rented acres must be just as good tobacco and cotton land as that you are planting.
- "3. All cotton rented acres may be planted to food crops, either for home use or for livestock.
- "4. One-half of the tobacco-rented acres may be planted to food crops for home use or for livestock; the other half of the tobacco rented acres must be left idle or put in some crop to improve the soil.
- "Please read your copy of tobacco contract, reading very carefully paragraphs 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12. These paragraphs state plainly the situation with regard to rented acres and tenants. If you do not understand the instructions on the contract, if you will come by the office I will be glad to help you."

TIRES OUTLAST BRAKES IN TEST

Severe Trials Prove Value Of Newly Designed Goodyear Tire

"Cars had been improving rapidly and tread wear became more of a problem. The road tests all proved conclusively, however, that tire mileage had been stepped up and non-skid wear increased on an average of 43 per cent.

"The improvements of the G-3 were

accomplished by widening and flattening the tread surface in contact with the road, widening the riding ribs and narrowing the grooves between the non-skid blocks and increasing the number of non-skid blocks in the tire's circumference.

"In my opinion the G-3 tire is the most important contribution of the tire manufacturer to motoring since the introduction of the balloon tire," it was stated.
