The evening programs will feature community singing, games, dramatizations, pageants, Sunday evening vespers, and a final camp fire exercise.

While in Raleigh the club members will be the guests of State College, and will be under the supervision of chaperones and leaders. Everything possible will be done to assure their safety and comfort.
