Processing Tax on Cotton

Is Paid by the Consumer

The processing tax on cotton is paid by the consumer when any product manufactured from cotton is paid by the consumer when any product manufactured from cotton is purchased. It is added to the manufactured article before it is sold to the retail merchant. The rate is 4.2 cents a pound net weight of cotton used in the manufactured article. The average amount paid by the consumer is about 8 cents on sheets; 3 1-2 cents on a work shirt; 8 1-4 cents on a pair of overalls, and about one cent per yard
