

Potato Bill Starts Auspicious Journey Through Congress

Every Indication That Bill Will Receive Speedy and Favorable Action

The Irish potato bill started its way through the legislative channels of Congress this week with sponsors hopeful of early passage.

Introduced by Representative Lindsay Warren of the North Carolina First Congressional District, the measure would make potatoes a basic commodity, provide for sales quotas and levy a tax of 75 cents on every 100 pounds of potatoes sold in excess of the allotment.

The measure drafted by the farm administration represented much agitation for control motivated by low prices. Marketing agreements failed to meet expectation to the clamor for control similar to programs for tobacco and cotton.

The movement originated in eastern North Carolina, a great early potato growing area, but quickly spread to other states, getting strong support from Maine.
