

Response by Parents Over State Is Classified as Only "Fair"

North Carolina parents are classed as "fair" in their responses to the appeal of the Buneau of Census, the State Board of Health and the State ERA for a complete rgistration of babies born in the State during the past year, Dr. John H. Hamilton, director of the Division of Vital Statistics, is informed.

North Carolinians had reported ap proximately one-third of the number of births recorded for 1933 on the little cards sent out from Washington up to the end of last wek. Recorded births in 1933 reached 75,422 in 1933 and already in 1934 the number has reached 79,350, by which Dr. Hami Iton estimates that complete recording will show at least 80,000 births in the State last year. Martin County parents have report

d in the present "Register Your Baby" campaign the births of 234 children during the past year, or 33.2 per cent of the 705 actually recorded births for the year 1933, up to last week, as compared with about 33 per cent for the State, Dr. Hamilton said.

This indicates that fully 50,000 par ents in North Carolina have had children born to them during the past year who have not filled in the buffcolored cards distributed by the Postoffice Department to them from the postoffice from which they receive mail, said Dr. Hamilton. The children who have thus been slighted may have occasion many times in the future to condemn the parental neglect, the vital statistics man said.

The campaign is about to end, but there is yet time for parents to secure these cards from the nearest post office, the State Board of Health or from the field or case workers for the relief organization, if they have misplaced those received earlier, and get
