Beaufort County farmers shipped a car of hogs from Aurora last week to make the first such cooperative sale since 1932.

Contract Favorable To Small Farmers

Where the base acreage is 3.2 acres or less the tobacco grower may plant the base acreage of the farm or three acres, which ever is smaller, and may

sell his base production allotment not to exceed 2,400 pounds. The plant this acreage, however, the growers must agree that no rental or adjustment payments, including any payment for deficiency in sales shall be made under the 1935 contract. To secure these payments the grower

must reduce his acreage and poundage according to the terms of the contract.

Most of the 15,000 pounds of 16-pedera seed ordered by the Harnett County farm agent has been distributed to the farmers.
