More Pay for Shorter Hours

The lower branch of the General Assembly, acting with more than usual speed, approved a bill increasing the salaries of solicitors before this paper got around to expressing its disapproval, so we'll take the opportunity now to put ourselves on record on the question. But the general run of solicitors that we have notice were well enough paid by a state that must continue to levy a general sales for emergency revenue before the house decided to raise their pay to four thousand five hundred per year.


