POISONED BAIT RECOMMENDED FOR CUTWORMS

Is Effective and Inexpensive; May Be Prepared At Home

Applications of poisoned bait to gardens and fields in the spring will prevent the tremendous damage often caused by cutworms. C. H. Brannon, extension entomologist at State College, says that an effective and inexpensive bait can be

mixed at home. When properly applied, it will not injure the plants. He recommends a mixture of 1 pound of Paris green to 50 pounds of wheat bran, with just enough water to moisten thoroughly.

If Paris green cannot be obtained, sodium fluoride will give good results in the same dosage. Branning points, out, but lead arsenate and calcium arsenate should not be used, since they do not give good results.

The bran and poison should be thoroughly mixed dry in a tub or other vessel he says, and then gradually moistened until all the bait is damp. The bran should be wet enough to crumble when squeezed in the hand, but not sticky or mushy.

When mixing the bait, do not breathe any more of the fumes than necessary, he warns, and afterwards keep it out of the reach of animals and children.

The first application should be broadcast at the rate of 15 to 20 pounds, dry weight, to the acre just before the young plants come up, he says. Applied in the evening, the bait will be fresh when the worms become active.

One application usually lasts for several days, but it should be repeated immediately after a heavy rain. When the bait is applied where the plants are above ground, he cautions, do not allow lumps of bait to come in contact with the plants.
