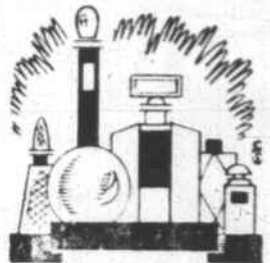

Two Methods of Curing Hog Meat

There are two principal methods of curing meat advocated in North Carolina—the brine cure and the dry salt cure, either of which is satisfactory. Common salt is the basis of all meat curing and in either method is the predominant factor. In both cures sugar is sometimes used to give the meat a better flavor and to counteract the action of the salt by keeping the muscles soft, where salt alone makes them hard. Formulas for both the brine cure and the dry salt cure are given in Extension Folder 34 on "Killing and Curing Meat on the Farm." Copies of this folder may be had free upon application to the Agricultural Editor at State College.

Next Meeting Will Be Held in Jamesville Latter Part of January

Program included: Report on Roper Club by Bill Bell; talks by Harold Swain, Joe Holliday and Earl Spruill; quartet, Grayson Everett, Paul Brey, Harry Chesson, Woodrow Collins; harp music, Gordon Chesson and Cecil Craft; music by Roper school band.

Objectives for the coming year include: More association between the

chapters; visit and observe other public speaking, livestock judging, chapters at work; create friendly father and son banquet; summer picnival between chapters in athletics, etc; promotion of rural leadership.
