

Severe Weather in Section Hindering Plant Bed Sowing

Ground Frozen and Seeds Already Sowed May Not Survive

The severe weather prevailing in this section recently has greatly hindered the planting and sowing of tobacco beds.

As a rule, the seeds are sown during the middle of January, and although ground conditions have not been so favorable, reports coming in from various sections of the county are to the effect that some few farmers have planted beds.

Unless the weather turns warmer no plant beds will be sown this week. The ground is frozen and those who have planted their seed are afraid their work has been in vain, for there is little prospect of the seed enduring this weather.
