

Chicks Should Not Be Fed Immediately After Hatched

Nature has given the newly hatched chick a balanced ration in the form of unabsorbed yolk which should maintain the chick for 72 hours. However, satisfactory results are obtained if feed and water are given the chicks as soon as they are placed under the hover, or in the starter battery. The chicks usually go to eating in several hours and

do well under these conditions. If the baby chicks are to be shipped, however, it is best not to give any feed until they arrive at destination.
