

The Uncertain Fate of Man



So far as we know, he was what we consider "a good soldier"; that is, he was imbued with the desire to kill as many of the enemy as he could, which qualifies him to a page in the history of war as a good soldier.

Going along with him, through his training in the arts of a mechanic and builder, and through his marriage, we find him drifting for some years; drifting with people of questionable character, unfailthful to his wife, frequenting and patronizing gambling games; going on, he becomes the designer and architect of a crime on an extreme plan. With plenty of nerve he undertakes the carrying out of one of the most heinous crimes that man can commit, which was finally solved and which caused his execution.
