Set Sweet Potato Plants At Least 12 Inches Apart

Sweet potato plants should be spaced 12 inches apart in rows from three to three and one-half feet apart. This planting reduces the number of "Jumboes" and also reduces the losses from stem rot. Where the crop is to be harvested for the early market the plantings should be made at least 18 inches apart in three foot rows. Plantings should be made on high ridges, if possible, as better stands are secured than when planted in low places.
