Processing taxes killed by the recent decision of the Supreme Court declaring the Agricultural Adjustment Act unconstitutional, include the following:  
Wheat 30 cents per bushel.  
Cotton, 4.2 cents a pound;

Hogs, \$2.25 per hundredweight;  
Corn, 5 cents per bushel;  
Rye, 30 cents a bushel;  
Tobacco, varied by types from \$1.98 cents on flue cured to 3.5 cents a pound on burley.  
Sugar, 1-2 cent a pound;  
Peanuts, 1 cent a pound.
