### Senator Byrd and the Tax Bill

The United States Chamber of Commerce, which is made up principally of the representative of the wealth of this nation, advocates a system of handling the business of the country which has proven too much for the individual small business man; and these big business enterprises have ruled our business practices for so long that they are now unwilling to turn loose.

They do not like any changes made in our methods of taxation. The government cannot devise any means of taxation that will suit them. They fight ever change proposed, because if they are made to pay taxes on an equal basis with poor folks they claim it is oppressive to them.

With the power of the wealthy organizations centralized, and all pulling together, the little man finds himself entirely outclassed, and there are always some congressmen who are able to see things the way wealth sees them.

Take the tax bill passed at the recent session of Congress. Senator Byrd, of Virginia, cannot understand that the bill is fair to the wealthy. He evi-

dently seems to think that any tax bill is fair to the poor; but when it comes to wealth, it is always easy for him to see that the laws are very unfair. On the other hand, Congressman Doughton, of North Carolina, thinks the tax measure is fair to all concerned.

### Setback for the Easy Divorce Law

Our easy, lax divorce law has suffered a great setback by a recent supreme court decision. Those fellows who thought they could slap their children out of the back door, kick their wives, knock the table over and run off and get a divorce under the two-year separation provision of the law—as well as the women who thought it lawful to desert their husbands and children and run off with other men and get a divorce under the two-year separation law—find themselves mistaken. Not only have they found themselves mistaken but divorces obtained under such circumstances are illegal, and those who have remarried since are guilty of bigamy.

The supreme court declared the two-year provision applied only to cases where both parties assented and agreed to voluntary separations.

The legislature has opened the doors of divorce wide, and with thousands of unreliable people marriage has become a farce. Most of our divorce laws should be abolished. All marriages should be well considered, and these foolish, hasty weddings should be avoided. Whenever they are entered into, then the contracting parties should be forced to stick to their obligations.

### Use Common Sense

How is Landon going to discredit the works of the Roosevelt administration, when even the New York bankers are saying that their business is exceedingly good? How can they complain? They have nothing to complain about, except that poor folks are having a good time, too.

When you vote this year, use your common horse sense. It will pay.

### Where To Keep Your Eye

Both the Democratic and Republican parties have strong anti-trust planks in their platforms—but the spot to keep your eye on is which party are the trusts putting their money on? You will find them financing the Landon campaign. That is because they expect more favors from the Republicans than they do for the Democrats.

### Individual Batting Marks

There is very little to report on the batting front this week. The team as a whole dropped just 3 points from last week, from .378 to .275, but that was good enough to win 4 out of 6 starts, including three from the Greensies. Corbett is still the big leader, having more times at bat, runs scored, number hits, two-baggers and stolen bases than any other Martin, besides being tied for first in three-baggers and standing second in total bases. Black has most homers, total bases and runs batted in. Gaylord and Douglass are leading the team with a .316 percentage between them. Corbett raised his mark a little, while Black fell down about the same amount. Fred Walters is pushing .300, his 298 being 3 points up from last week, while Ferrell dropped another 13 points to .272.
