



COMMENTS:-Appropriations for the County General Fund are \$1,180.00 less than appropriated for that fund last year. Requirements for bonded indebtedness are \$6,000.00 greater than last year. The health fund appropriations must be increased \$5,000.00 to take care of vaccination campaign, which we did not have last year. Substantial increase must be made in the poor fund to take care of the many worthy applicants and relief of suffering humanity.

But for the substantial increase in expected revenues an increase in the tax rate would be necessary if the county should maintain its many departments and not run a deficit.
