The United States is hurrying warships off to Spain for the purpose of protecting Americans. We have heard many people say they would never leave their native land to fight a foreign enemy.

We remember April, 1898, when Spain was then bearing down on her colonies. It was then that Admiral Dewey slipped into Manila Bay on a bright Sunday morning and sank the Spanish fleet. We take it that if the Spaniards begin destroying American property and lives that our warships will be used with the same promptness that Dewey's fleet was.

Certainly, we are not mad with Spain, nor is she mad with us. Yet when we consider that wars are not started by reason, but are brought about usually by some spontaneously unfriendly incident or flare-ups, we need not be surprised at anything.

A Penitent Coward

Burt Crowder left his home, his wife, and five children at Kinsey, N. C., 43 years ago. He was heard from no more until last week, when he returned—at the age of 79—and knocked on the door where his family lived, to find only one son and a daughter living, his wife and three of the children having died since his desertion over two score years ago.

He stood at the door—a penitent coward—knocking for admittance, with nothing but a wasted life to present to the world; with all opportunity to serve his family behind him, because most of them have passed on to their rewards.

COMMENTS:—Appropriations for the County General Fund are \$1,180.00 less than appropriated for that fund last year. Requirements for bonded indebtedness are \$6,000.00 greater than last year. The health fund appropriations must be increased \$5,000.00 to take care of vaccination campaign, which we did not have last year. Substantial increase must be made in the poor fund to take care of the many worthy applicants and relief of suffering humanity.

But for the substantial increase in expected revenues an increase in the tax rate would be necessary if the county should maintain its many departments and not run a deficit.
