

Better Outlook For Business Reported By Labor Leaders

Retail Store Buyers Going To Northern Markets In Greater Numbers

Washington.—Signs of a business pick-up this fall "stronger than had been expected" were reported by the American Federation of Labor a few days ago in its monthly business survey.

At the same time, the federal reserve board noted that the volume of production, employment and trade held up to its May level throughout June, contrary to a usual seasonal decline.

"Buyers for retail stores are flocking to New York and Chicago in larger numbers than in any of the last six years," the A. F. of L. survey said.

The survey repeated several former assertions that "re-employment is not keeping pace with recovery" and that "if recovery is to put the unemployed to work, present hour schedules must not be lengthened."

Wages, the survey added, must keep pace with living costs which "rose 2 percent from April to June. The reserve board's observations, made in its monthly summary of general business and financial conditions, noted that wholesale prices of commodities advanced in June, reflecting in part the effects of the drought.

The board's seasonally adjusted index of industrial production increased from 101 per cent of the 1923-25 average in May to 103 per cent in June.

Rotenone Dust Will Kill Mexican Beetle

Rotenone dust is not poisonous to human beings, but it is deadly to Mexican bean beetles, according to C. H. Brannon, extension entomologist at State College.

It is also a good insecticide for controlling the Harlequin bug (fire bug, terrapin bug) on cabbage, collards, turnips, and the like, he added, and it will eradicate cabbage worms.

Rotenone, which is obtained from both derris and cube root, may be purchased from dealers all over the state, Brannon pointed out.

The pure dust is unusually strong he continued, so it is diluted with talc. For bean beetles and other such insect pests, the mixture should contain 3-4 of 1 per cent rotenone.

Rotenone may be sprayed on the garden plants, but it does not give as good results as when dusted on. The ready prepared rotenone-talc mixture is not suitable for use as a spray, Brannon warned.

When making a spray, ground derris or cube root should be dissolved in water at rate of 1 1-2 pounds of dust to 50 gallons of water.
