Large Pack House Is Destroyed by Blaze

Fire, believed to have been incendiary in origin, destroyed the pack house and its contents belonging to Mr. E. Claude House, near Robersonville, Tuesday night about 9:30 o'clock, resulting in a loss that runs well into the hundreds of dollars. Twenty-five barrels of corn, seven barns of tobacco and farm implements and other tools were burned. The Robersonville volunteer fire company answered a call and prevented the fire from spreading to other buildings, but it was impos-

sible to save the house or any of its contents.

Charlie Highfield, Williamston auctioneer, happened to be passing at the time, and as he called Mr. House a man was seen to run from the packhouse and escape in a car parked in the road a short distance away. Apparently the man fired the building intentionally or while trying to steal tobacco from the pack house. The tracks of the person were followed by Mr. House and officers to and from the building, but no clues have been found as to the identity of the man.
