Heavy Traffic Reported On Roanoke Here Last Month

Traffic on the Roanoke River last month is believed to have established a new record of activity, according to Hugh Spruill, bridge keeper. Nearly 100 boats passed through the draw during the period. Cargoes handled by the boats included lumber, logs, tobacco, gasoline and oil and general freight. The number reported going through the drawbridge does not include those boats docking just below the bridge, the keeper explaining that large cargoes were handled by them in the month of November.

Asks Cooperation of Rural Postal Patrons

"It isn't much of a request, but rural letter carriers will be aided to a great extent," Postmaster Leslie T. Fowden said today in directing the rural patrons of the office to buy stamps for their letters and cards and not place money in the boxes. There is very little trouble attached to stamping letters by the patron, but the carrier experiences delay in handling money with cold hands. One or two cases would not make a great deal of difference, but there are hundreds of stops the carrier must make, and a short delay at each box counts up big at the end of the trip. Postmaster Fowden is making every effort to offer local postal patrons the best service possible, and in turn asks the cooperation of the people. Early mailing will help. Careful wrapping and legible writing are necessary to make sure deliveries.
