Mary Cotton, 35-year-old colored woman, was fatally wounded Satur-day midnight, when Alice Wiggins, 53-year-old colored woman, fired a load of shot from a single-barrel gun into the woman's abdomen. The Cotton woman died in a Tarboro hospital early Sunday morning.

The Cotton woman also maintained that Alice Wiggins opened the door and fired on her without warning.
