

Warns Against Plant Diseases Over State During This Season

Weather conditions have favored heavy outbreaks of plant diseases this year, according to Dr. R. F. Poole, plant pathologist at the N. C. Agricultural Experiment Station.

Apple scab has appeared in many orchards, he continued, but it can be controlled with sulphur sprays when the weather is mild. In hot weather, spray with Bordeaux mixture.

Bad weather has retarded the development of cotton, corn, beans, melons, and other plants, but they will have a fairly good resistance to disease if they are not thinned too soon.

Don't use Bordeaux mixture on peach trees, Dr. Poole warned. He also said to spray or dust with sulphur to control brown rot on peaches, cherries, and plums. For spraying, use any type of sulphur that suspends well in water.

The white, powdery mildew on Dorothy Perkins roses, beans, pumpkins, squash, clovers, lilacs, crepe myrtle and other plants can be controlled with sulphur spray or dust.

Leaf spot, or blister disease, on maple and oak has appeared in parts of the State. Although it mars the foliage, this disease will not kill the trees. It can be controlled by spraying or dusting with sulphur.

Dr. Poole also stated that diseased sweet potato seed will always produce diseased plants. But healthy plants can be grown from good seed planted in soil free from disease. Don't plant potatoes this year on land where they were diseased last year.

Buy Special Ensilage Corn Seed for Trial

Eight dairymen of Yadkin County recently ordered nine bushels of Eureka ensilage corn seed and seven other dairymen later ordered 10 bushels for demonstration purposes.

Strip-Cropping Aid In Soil Conservation

Farmers in the Huntersville area of the soil conservation report that they are finding it much easier to establish rotations where strip-cropping is practiced, according to John C. Shiver, assistant soil conservationist.

Such crops as small grains, sorghums, legumes, and grasses are readily adaptable to the strip cropping and fit in well in strip rotations with clean-cultivated crops. Strips can be used to establish terrace lines, making it possible to build terraces at a more convenient time.

Width of the strips is dependent upon the slope of the land and requirements of the individual farmer, Shiver said. On gentle slopes it is considered good practice to lay off the strips 20 to 30 feet wide and on steep slopes 40 to 50 feet wide.
