Wake Forest And Carolina Meet on Deacon Gridiron
Situation Much the Same as Last Year, With Wake Forest Still Underdog

Wake Forest, Oct. 15.—Saturday afternoon, here on Gore Field, the gridiron clubs of Wake Forest and North Carolina University will go together in a contest that bids fair to provide many thrills for the large home-coming crowd that is expected to be on hand for this football attraction.

While the Tar Heels, already victorious over N. C. State and N. Y. U., will be top heavy favorites to bowl over the Deacons tomorrow, those who remember the 1936 contest between the two clubs which was played in Charlotte before an audience of twelve thousand gasping fans, will recall how Carolina trailed 0-7, in a tilt it was supposed to win easily, according to the deponents, for over three periods and was virtually blasted out of the stadium during those minutes of play by the underdogs.

And it was only after the Heels' two-team system finally wore down the scrappy Deac eleven, that two desperate touchdowns were pushed across for the 14-7 victory, in the waning moments of play. One of those touchdowns came as a result of a circus catch over the goal line by Captain Dick Buck, who was probably the greatest pass receiver ever seen in the south, of a pass thrown by this year's Carolina Co-Captain Crowell Little.

The final Heel tally in that thrill-packed contest resulted from a sustained drive that ended with a twelve yard dash over the weary and exhausted Deacons by this same Little.

Now, the situation is largely the same as it was in 1936. Carolina is heavily favored to win, to the extent that many Deac followers are hoping that the highly touted Carolina club can be held to three touchdowns.

Coach Peahead Walker, of Wake Forest will be making his debut into Southern Conference and Big Five coaching circles with the Carolina tilt, being elected head coach during the past summer.

Both squads are reported to be in fairly good condition, although Coach Ray Wolf is expected to save his boys as much as possible for the Tulane and Fordham games on the following Saturdays.
