Thirteen Cases Are Heard In Recorder's Court Last Monday

Drunken Drivers Sentenced To the Roads in Two Cases

Holding its first session since the first of this month, the Martin County Recorder's court handled thirteen cases last Monday when Judge H. O. Peel stamped down on drunken automobile drivers and ordered two of them to the roads.

The holiday enjoyed by the court allowed an accumulation of cases, the number if apportioned to two sessions being about the average handled by the tribunal in recent months. A fair-sized crowd was attracted to the session which was concluded before the noon hour.

Clyde Silverthorne, veteran who was shell-shocked in the World war, was adjudged guilty in the case charging disorderly conduct. A three months' road sentence was meted out, the court suspending judgment upon condition that the defendant enter a veterans' hospital.

John Pittman, charged with careless and reckless driving, and An-

drew Everett, facing the court for alleged violation of the liquor laws, failed to answer when called. Papers for their immediate arrests were prepared at the direction of the court.

Mary Eliza Davis, charged with violating the liquor laws, was adjudged guilty, the court suspending judgment in the case for two years.

After the State rested in the case charging Jack Dixon with disorderly conduct, the defense counsel made a motion for judgment as of non-suit and the motion was allowed by the court.

Charged with reckless driving and operating a motor vehicle with improper equipment, Amos Williams was fined \$10 and had his driver's license revoked for a period of three months.

The case charging John Smith with breaking out of the Hamilton jail was continued under prayer for judgment until the first Monday in next November.

Bernard Lewis, charged with drunken driving, was fined \$100, the court revoking his driver's license for one year. Unable to pay the fine Lewis was later sentenced to the roads for a period of six months.

Will Modica, charged with assaulting a female in three cases, was sentenced to the roads for a term of nine months, or three months in each case.

Charged with violating the liquor laws, Sam Hardison was found not guilty. After the State rested in the case, counsel for the defendant moved for judgment as of non-suit and the motion was granted.

Jesse Matthews, charged with drunken driving, was sentenced to the roads for a term of sixty days, the court suspending judgment upon

the admission of defendant into the State hospital for inebriates at Raleigh. The judgment revoked the defendant's driving license for one

year. Modica is said to have run a close second in the number of times he has been before the court.
