Housekeeping Studies Keeps Local Girl Busy

Four seniors in the home economics department of Meredith College

Alta Critcher, of Williamston; Virginia Vaughan of Washington; Louise Biggs of Lumberton, and Edna Martin of Mt. Olive—know what it is to be both housekeeper and student. For the past three weeks they have been residing in the Mere-Ellen-Love apartment in Vann Hall, running the five room modern apartment on a budget basis while continuing regular class work. Four week's residence in the house is required of all seniors before graduation, providing practical training in home management.

Helpful Hints For Filing Income Tax

Returns are required of every individual who is single or who is married but not living with husband or wife who for the year had a gross income of \$5,000 or more or a net income of \$1,000 or more, and of every individual who is married and living with husband or wife, if no joint return is made and if (1) such individual has a net income of \$2,500 or more or a gross income of \$5,000 or more and the other spouse

has no gross income or (2) such individual and his spouse each has a gross income, regardless of the amount of net income, and the aggregate net income of the two is \$2,500 or more, or (3) such individual and his spouse each has a gross income and the aggregate gross income is \$5,000 or more. Widowers, widows, divorcees, and married persons separated by mutual consent are classed as single persons. The personal exemptions are \$1,000 for single persons and \$2,500 for married persons living together and for heads of families.

Husband and wife living together at the close of the taxable year may file a single joint return (even though one has no gross income) or make separate returns on the income of each. If separate returns are filed, one may not report income which belongs to the other, but must report only the income which actually belongs to him.

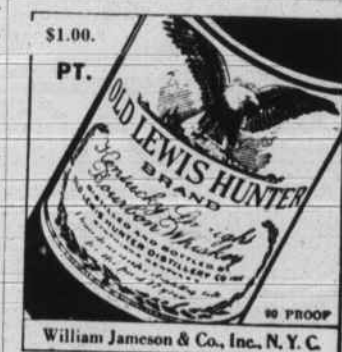
If a joint return is filed, such return is treated as a taxable unit, and the income disclosed is subject to both the normal tax and the surtax. The liability with respect to the tax on a joint return is joint and several. No joint return may be made if either husband or wife is a non-resident alien.

If a joint return is not made by an agent of the taxpayers, it must be signed by both husband and wife and sworn to before a proper officer by the spouse preparing the return, or if neither or both prepare the return, then by both spouses.

Where separate returns are filed by husband and wife, the joint personal exemption of \$2,500 may be taken by either or divided between them in any proportion as agreed upon.

In filing a joint return, husband and wife compute the earned income credit in the same manner as in filing separate returns. If taxpayer's net income is not more than \$3,000, the entire net income is considered to be earned net income.

Husband and wife may elect each year whether to file a joint return or separate returns. Where, however, joint or separate returns have been filed for a particular year, neither husband nor wife may after the due date of the return file an amended return or returns on a different basis for that year.



4 Dead, Scores Hurt As Tornado Sweeps Broad Path Near Windsor

Scores in Need After Storm
Destroys Many Houses in
Green's Cross Section

Windsor, Feb. 21.—A tornado swept through the Green's Cross section of Bertie County early tonight, demolishing an undetermined number of houses, tore down trees and communication lines, and left scores of persons in need of assistance.

Four persons were left dead in the wake of the storm, and more than a score of persons were brought to the Windsor hospital for treatment. Many homeless persons were given refuge by Windsor residents. A heavy rain which followed the tornado added to the difficulties of the afflicted.
