

### Closing Program In Colored School

A crowded program is featuring the commencement season for the local colored school, Principal E. J. Hayes announcing eight events on the six-day schedule.

The first of the events, "High School in Excelsis," was held last evening. This evening the seventh graders, and there is a sizeable group of them, are featuring the program series. Rev. R. I. Johnson, rector St. Cyprian Episcopal church, New Bern, will preach the annual sermon Sunday afternoon at 3:30 p. m. Next Monday night, the grammar grade pupils appear in a comic opera. A review of exhibits by the home economics and manual arts groups is scheduled for Tuesday at 2 p. m. The seniors hold their class exercises Tuesday night.

The various clubs and societies will hold their anniversary celebrations Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock, and that evening at eight, Dr. F. D. Bluford, president of Agricultural and Technical College, of Greensboro, will deliver the commencement address. Large crowds are expected to attend the closing exercises.

Wilmington—Miss Williamson is a graduate of Fassfern school and attended Finch Junior College in New York. Miss Williamson also studied art in France for one year and has been doing Little Theatre work for eight years.

The young men consist of: Paul Leroy Lambert, Cherokee; Mr. Lambert is a graduate of Carlyle and is the grandson of one of the chiefs at the Cherokee reservation. His first cousin is Chief Jack Blythe. He was born on the reservation.

George Clarence Courtney, Jr., Lenoir; Mr. Courtney is a graduate of the University of North Carolina and is secretary of the Lenoir board of trade.

Voit Gilmore, Winston-Salem; Mr. Gilmore attended Georgia Military Academy and spent four years at the University of North Carolina.

U. Benton Blalock, Jr., Wadesboro. Mr. Blalock's education consists of two years at North Carolina State College and two years at Duke university.

It was pointed out by Coleman W. Roberts, executive commissioner of North Carolina's exhibit that in making the selection of the personnel, it was necessary to take into consideration the applicant's education, personal appearance, health, geographical location, etc., and while many hundreds of applications were received, only a limited few could be selected. Mr. Roberts further stated that while the parents of the applicants each thought his or her daughter was one of the most beautiful, and son one of the most handsome, everyone else thought the same thing about theirs, and the staff had to be selected according to the best judgment of the commission.

It was further stated that the group comprising the tour will cover 2000 miles and will visit the principal cities and resort areas in the State from Murphy to Manteo.

According to Mr. Roberts the purpose of the tour is to further acquaint and to refresh the memories of the world's fair attendants with the tourist, agricultural and industrial development that is taking place in North Carolina and their possibilities for advancement. Many hotels, chambers of commerce and communities throughout North Carolina are playing host to these young men and young women on this tour.

These attendants will be on duty at the world's fair from 10 in the morning until 10 at night, and will serve in the capacity of North Carolina's exhibit and intelligently answer any questions that are asked concerning the State.

Mr. Roberts further stated that North Carolina's exhibit will not be one of products nor will it provide its guests with any unusual thrills or any special forms of entertainment, but is purely an inspirational exhibit to encourage investment and travel in North Carolina. North Carolina's exhibit will be located in the Court of States.

North Carolina's exhibit and its attendants are sponsored by the North Carolina World's Fair commission of which Mr. W. E. Fenner, of Rocky Mount, is chairman.

Plans were made public today by L. W. Anderson, Robersonville school principal, of the Robersonville school finals. Commencement proper begins Sunday, April 23, at 2:30 o'clock when Rev. C. T. Thrift, of Halifax, will preach the baccalaureate sermon.

On Monday night, April 24th, the seniors will present their play, "The Man in the Green Shirt," a three act farce by Myrtle Elsey.

The class night exercises will be held Tuesday night, April 25th, at 8 o'clock. At this time the seniors will present an original two-act play entitled "Every Boy's Dream," directed by Susie Thrift and Raymond Snipes.

The regular commencement night program will begin promptly at 8 o'clock on Wednesday evening, April 26th, when his excellency, Governor Clyde R. Hoey will be the principal speaker. Plans have been made to accommodate a record crowd.

The grounds will be lighted and loud speakers will be placed on both sides of the building as well as in the halls. No seats will be reserved except two for each of the graduate's parents. Admission to those seats will be by card. Hugh Horton will introduce Governor Hoey, and the high school glee club will render several selections. Wilbur James, class valedictorian, will talk briefly on our changing curriculum, and Chandler Smith, class salutatorian, will talk on "The Change from the Traditional type of School to the Modern Type."

Diplomas will be awarded to possibly 54 students. Robersonville's largest graduating class. Around 55 seventh grade students will also graduate. Besides these, 17 students will be awarded certificates showing that they have completed the equivalent of a twelfth grade course.

Around thirty commercial students will be awarded certificates.

On Thursday evening following commencement night, Mrs. Selma Meadows will present her piano pupils in their annual post commencement recital.
