Highlights Of Auto Fatalities During Month Of August

Motor vehicle traffic fatalities were two less in August, 1939, than for August, 1938. During August, 1938, 84 were killed compared with 82 for August, 1939.

From January 1, 1939, to September 1, 538 persons were killed in motor vehicle traffic accidents compared with 537 to September 1, 1938.

Twenty pedestrians were killed during August, 1939, compared with 38 for August, 1938. This represents a reduction of 48 per cent in all pedestrian fatalities.

Adult pedestrian fatalities dropped from 26 during August, 1938, to 14 during August, 1939. This represents a 50 per cent reduction in pedestrian fatalities in the adult age group.

Pedestrian fatalities in the age group under 15 years old was 4 less for August, 1939, than for August, 1938. Ten were killed during August, 1938, and six during August, 1939.

Non-collision fatalities increased 5 in August, 1939. The total number of fatalities from this type of accident being 18 in August, 1939 and 23 in August, 1938.

Auto collision with horse drawn vehicles accounted for 3 fatalities during August, 1939, while during August, 1938, no one was killed from this type accident.

Auto collision with fixed object claimed 10 lives during August, 1939 which is the largest number from this cause for any month during 1939 and 7 greater than for August, 1938.

In August, 1939, a total of 6 persons were killed in cities and towns, 4 pedestrians and 2 in other types of motor vehicle accidents. During August, 1938, 12 pedestrians were killed and 14 were killed in other types of motor vehicle accidents in cities and towns.

The number killed in cities and towns during August, 1939, was the smallest of any month since January 1, 1939.

Cities and towns include all incorporated towns of more than 1,000 population.
