Helpful Hints for The Holidays

With the most joyous season of the year, Christmas, just around the corner, one's thoughts turn to home decorations, cooking and gifts.

In decorating the home—use long leaf pine in sprays tied with red ribbon; on the walls, over the pictures, across doors—make holly wreaths—for something different, spray your tree with silver or gold gilt. Aim for gaiety not artistic arrangement—use tinsel on an ordinary green tree—make popcorn strings of cut outs of colored paper, all inexpensive but attractive.

An old legend, pertaining to the use of holly, long associated with Christmas, is that holly was used as the wreath of thorns and that before the crucifixion, the holly berries were white. From the drops of blood they turned to crimson, giving the attractive combination we have today.

A pretty centerpiece for the table can be made with three ordinary cans of various sizes, covered with crepe paper. Placing the largest at the bottom with fruit around it, the second largest on top with another type of fruit, etc, with sprigs of holly or pine used as a base on each layer.

Eating—and who doesn't enjoy that—often work a hardship on the housewife in the last minute hustle and bustle. A delicious receipt for Date and Nut Bread, which can be made a week in advance is as follows:

Cut one package pitted dates in small pieces.

Add 1-1/2 cups boiling water and 2-teaspoons soda to mixture. Let cool.

Mix 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1-1/2-cups sugar, 2 eggs, 1-1/2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons vanilla, 1 cup broken walnuts or pecans. Mix with date mixture. Bake in loaf pan at 325° about fifty minutes. Remove from pan and when cool, place in airtight container. This can be used as cake or it makes delicious sandwiches, sliced thin with cream cheese or your own choice of filling.

For homemade candy try this:

Nut Britties

1 cup nuts, peanuts or walnuts preferred
2 cups sugar
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-4 teaspoon soda

If peanuts are used, rub off brown coats—sprinkle nuts over a well-buttered, large shallow pan. Melt sugar in a heavy skillet. When all lumps are out, mix other ingredients and pour at once in a thin mixture over nuts. Allow to cool and break into irregular pieces.
