THERE ARE CAKES AND CAKES!

Every family has its favorite recipes, recipes that have been used over and over again and yet are not forgotten. We in the home service have our favorite recipes, too, those which our customers keep asking for and we know are good because they have been tested. Our favorite of the past few months we give you first, a "Red Devils' Food, with a Baked on Icing," especially good for warm weather as the icing never does get soft, and for something different try "Peach Torte," a soft combination of egg whites, flour and sugar, an ideal dessert for that "Dessert Bridge or Porch Supper."

Red Devil's Food Cake

- 1-2 c water
- 1-2 tsp soda
- 1-2 c cocoa
- 2-3 c butter
- 1-3-4 c sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 1-2 c flour
- 1-2 tsp salt
- 3-4 c sour milk
- 1 tsp vanilla

Mix first 3 ingredients and allow to stand while mixing other ingredients. Cream butter and sugar, add eggs. Add dry ingredients and last cocoa mixture and vanilla. Bake in a 12x8x2 1-4 greased pan 45 minutes at 350°. Add frosting and bake 15 minutes longer.

Frosting

- 2 egg whites
 - 1-2 c nuts
 - 1 c brown sugar
- Beat egg whites until stiff, add sugar gradually and continue beating. Spread on cake and sprinkle with chopped nuts.

Peach Torte

- 1-1-3 c sifted cake flour
- 1-1-3 tsp baking powder
- 1-2 c butter
- 1-2 c sugar
- 4 egg yolks
- 1-2 tsp almond flavoring
- 5 tbsp milk
- 4 egg whites
- 1 c sugar
- 1-8 tsp cream of tartar
- 1 c fresh peaches (sliced)

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and sift together three times. Cream butter until soft, add sugar gradually, then add egg yolks, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Add flour alternately with milk in small amounts, then add flavoring. Spread in two buttered 9-inch layer pans. Beat egg whites until frothy, add cream of tartar and beat until stiff, adding 1 cup sugar a little at a time. Spread in equal amounts on top of each unbaked layer. Bake in slow oven 325° for 25 minutes, then increase heat to moderate oven—350°—and bake 30 minutes longer. Put layers together with peaches, garnish with whipped cream.

Fruit Short Cake

- 2 c flour
- 5 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp salt
- 5 tbsp shortening
- 4 tbsp sugar
- 1 egg, beaten
- 3-4 c milk

Sift dry ingredients together—cut in shortening, then add egg with milk. Press mixture into two greased 8-inch cake pans. Bake 12 to 15 min. at 450°. Butter each layer while hot, then add crushed sweetened peaches or any fruit desired between layers and on top. Service with hard sauce or cream.

Orange Marmalade Cup-Cakes

- 2 c sifted flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1-4 tsp salt
- 1-2 c butter
- 1 c sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 tbsp powdered sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1-2 c milk
- 3-4 c orange marmalade
- 1 c slightly toasted coconut
- 1 egg white

Sift cake flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, then eggs one at a time and beat until very smooth and fluffy. Add vanilla, then dry ingredients and milk alternately. Pour into buttered cup cake pans and bake 15 to 20 minutes in 400° oven. Cool cup cakes and cover top and sides with orange marmalade. Roll in coconut and place on cookie sheet. Put spoonful of meringue made of egg white and powdered sugar on each cake and bake 15 minutes in 350° oven.

Lemon Squares

- 1-3-4 c cracker crumbs
 - 3-4 c melted butter
 - 3-4 c flour
 - 1 tsp baking powder
 - 1-2 c coconut
 - 1-2 c brown sugar
 - 2 tbsp milk
- Sift flour and baking powder, add crumbs, coconut and brown sugar and mix well. Add butter and milk. Spread 2-3 of mixture in buttered pan 7x11, spread with lemon filling and top with rest of mixture. Bake in 350° oven 30 minutes.

Filling
1 egg
1 c sugar
1 c boiling water
2 tsp cornstarch
1 tsp butter
Juice and rind of 1 lemon
Beat egg, add sugar, cornstarch, rind and gradually add boiling water. Cook until thick, add lemon juice and butter.

Pineapple Sponge Cake
1-2 c cake flour
2 tsp baking powder
6 egg whites
1-2 tsp salt
1-2 c sugar
3 egg yolks
1-2 c unsweetened pineapple juice
1 tsp lemon juice

Sift the flour, measure and sift 4 times with the baking powder. Beat GAL TWO HOME EC VEP foOR whites until foamy. Add the salt and beat until stiff but not dry. Add 3-4 c sugar to the whites, a little at a time. Beat yolks slightly, add 3-4 c sugar, 1-2 c fruit juice and the lemon juice; beat until light and sugar is dissolved. Fold in the flour, 1-4 at a time, counting 15 strokes. Fold in whites with 35 strokes. Pour into an ungreased angel cake pan and bake

in a slow oven (300°) 1 hour. Invert to cool.

Five Minute Spice Cake
(12 cup cakes)
2 c sifted flour
3 tsp baking powder
1-2 tsp salt
1-2 tsp cinnamon
1-3 c shortening
1-3 c brown sugar
1-2 c milk
1 egg, if desired
1-2 c seedless raisins

Sift dry ingredients together, cut in shortening, add milk and raisins. Beat thoroughly until batter is smooth. Bake as cup cakes at 400° for 20 minutes or as medium sized loaf in a tube pan at 350° for forty-five minutes. If paper cups are placed in muffin pans, it will not be necessary to oil the pans and the cakes may be served in the cups.
