### Unruly Youths Are Released from the County's Jail Here

**Pictures of Gun-Toters Lead Another Youth To Steal Toy Pistol**

They may not be hopeless, but several small colored youths are presenting a difficult and possibly serious problem to the courts and welfare authorities here. Disposition of the cases is still pending, and hardly a beginning has been made in one of them, the courthouse authorities stating they are at a loss as to know what to do. It is fairly certain that they will be jailed again if they insist on violating the laws.

About a week ago, William Henry Morgan and his brother, Samuel, who is better known as Sambo, were jailed for allegedly bricking several humble homes at the foot of the river hill, including that of a 90-year-old woman. Windows were knocked out, and one brick was said to have broken a mirror inside one of the shacks. A stay in jail, authorities thought, would possibly teach the wayward youths who are 14 and 12 years old respectively, a lesson. Things were working out all right until Wednesday when the blind and dependent mother of the two boys in some way raised \$5 or thereabouts and employed a lawyer. The boys were released in strict accordance with the laws with the mother poorer and the boys little better off, according to some. Unable to get one of the boys into an institution some time ago, welfare authorities are renewing their efforts now. Even if they succeed, the problem is still not solved.

The other problem which is typical of many centers around an 11-year-old boy who had seen too many gun-toters in the movies or who had been influenced by others gaining the idea from the shows that it is smart to carry a gun. Joe Henry Bonds was picked up in a local dime store yesterday for allegedly lifting a toy pistol from a counter. Marched down to Judge Wynne's juvenile court, the boy was still wearing his "Lone Ranger's" pistol holster, and a cheaper one on the other hip, but both were empty. The boy, entering the sixth grade next week, misrepresented the facts to the judge and he almost "lied" his way into jail. He did not give his true name, and using the tactics of an old maid he lowered his age by several years. Instead of calling the jailer, Judge Wynne released the boy but not until after he was assured that the mother would mete out punishment at home. If the boy's grandmother who was badly upset by the act, has anything to do with the judgment at home the lad will stay corrected for a long time for she stated to Judge Wynne that she was mad enough to kill the grandson. His divorced mother made it plain that the lad would be amply "cared for" when she got him home.

### Negro Is Shot While Charging on Officer

**Colored Population Congregating On Streets But No Trouble Was Reported**

Robersonville, Aug. 27.—Excited, reached a high pitch here last night when Officer Wade Griffin, acting in his own defense, shot Sam Heath, colored man, painfully on Third Street. The colored population turned out by the hundreds, Chief William Gray declaring that it seemed to him that they (the colored citizens) were out by the thousands merely to satisfy their own curiosity rather than to take part in any overt action contrary to law and order. A few threatening remarks were heard, but they were not considered serious. Learning of the shooting, Sheriff C. B. Roebuck, his deputy and several patrolmen in the county, came here, but the curiosity seekers dispersed quietly, some stating that the officer could hardly have been censured had he killed the man.

The officers were called to the warehouse district by Nightwatchman I. E. Nelson who reported that two colored men were fighting there. Reaching the warehouse section, Chief Gray and Officer Griffin were told that the two men had moved out Third Street and were believed to be continuing their fight in the second block where a goodly audience of colored people had gathered to watch the fight. The officers drove into the block and arrested Henry Grimes. Heath ran down the street, and the officers with Grimes in the rear seat overtook him with the car. He ran up the roadside bank, and Officer Griffin ran after him. Ordered to halt, Heath threw his hand in his hip pocket and turned on the officer. Not knowing whether Heath had a gun, Officer Griffin fired at the man. Failing to stop him with the first shot which penetrated Heath's thigh, the officer fired a second shot which did little damage but did stop Heath. It was later learned that Heath had no gun, but Henry Grimes, witnessing the trouble from the police car, told an Herald reporter in his jail cell last night that the officer did the right thing and that he was justified in shooting the man. Grimes added that the officer ought to have killed Heath.

must have been an headache with the occupation of Iran underway and with Japan softening toward the United States.

France is just about to blow up. Some call them communists, but a few individual Frenchmen, disgusted with Vichy, are taking action against the German collaborators. Former Premier Laval, a German stooge, was seriously shot this week by a red-blooded-Frenchman, late reports stating that Laval's condition had taken a turn for the worse. The attack is said to have precipitated a merciless purge among the French people, but the work of the saboteurs continues there.

President Roosevelt is expected to name a commission to go to Russia for a study of needs and possible increases in aid to the Soviets.

In this country attention still centers on reported gasoline shortages. The Senate is investigating, and dealers are shouting against the ceiling fixed for gasoline prices. In some sections the dealers are selling gasoline above the price fixed by the government.

Down in Argentina, widespread German activities were uncovered today, indicating that Hitler and his gang still have their eyes on the Western Hemisphere.

payment of the cost in the case charging John Manning, colored, with careless and reckless driving. The defendant gave notice of appeal and bond was required in the sum of \$50.

A continuance was granted the defendant in the case charging Ernest Lee with hit-and-run-and reckless driving.

Charged with trespass and larceny and receiving, Aubson Rogers was sentenced to the roads for a term of six months. At the conclusion of the evidence offered by the State, defense counsel made a motion for judgment as of not guilty. The motion was denied. At the conclusion of the evidence of the defense, the motion was renewed and again denied. Notice of appeal was given, and the defendant was required to post bond in the sum of \$200.

The case charging J. E. Smithwick with drunken driving was continued until next Monday.

D. D. Hill, charged with failing to list for taxation, was sentenced to the roads for thirty days. Hill pleaded not guilty in the case, explaining that he was on the roads last January. The records revealed that Hill was on the roads on and after January 27th, the court ruling that he had had ample time to comply with the tax laws before starting his term.
