ls Crotalaria A Good Crop To Be Used With Corn?

E C Blair, State College Extension Service agronomist, says that corn grown in alternate years in rotation with crotalaria at the Lower Coastal Plain Branch Station at Willard produced an average yield of 39 bushels per acre as compared with a yield of 23 bushels produced by continuous corn. When a corn-corn-crotalaria rotation was used the corn yields dropped to an average of 295 bushels per acre and nearly all of the increase was obtained in the first year following
