REFRIGERATOR SPECIALS

If you want someone to help with the cooking during these hot summer days, why not give the refrigerator a chance? It will be a ready assistant to you in making rolls, cookies, main dishes, salads and all kinds of desserts. Cookie doughs and yeast breads may be mixed and put in the refrigerator for several days, ready on short notice for the final rising and baking.

- Five Threes 3 pts water 3 c sugar 3 lemons 3 oranges 3 bananas 3 c grated pineapple Boil water and sugar together 5 min. Cool and add fruit pulp and extracted juice. Place in refrigerator to freeze. Stir several times throughout freezing if convenient.

- Frozen Fruit Salad 1-2 c diced oranges 1-2 c diced pineapple 1-2 c diced peaches 1 c mayonnaise 1-2 c diced grapefruit 1-2 c cherries Juice of 1 lemon 1 c whipped cream 1-2 c diced pears Mix fruit, lemon juice, mayonnaise and whipped cream. Freeze about three hours. Peppermint Stick Candy Cream 1-4 lb. or 1 c crushed peppermint stick candy 1-2 c coffee cream 1-2 c top milk 1-16 tsp salt Dissolve candy in hot milk. Add salt, coffee cream and pour into freezing tray. Freeze until quite firm, then remove to mixing bowl and beat with electric mixer until mix is light and creamy. (Don't over whip). Return to freezing tray quickly and allow to finish freezing. Note: This can be made without cream, using top milk if desired. A dessert most acceptable to children. Serve with chocolate sauce.

- Chocolate Sauce 1 c sugar 1 c evaporated milk 1-2 c light corn syrup 3 sq. bitter chocolate 1-4 c water 1 tsp vanilla Melt chocolate. Add sugar and syrup. Blend thoroughly; add water. Cook to soft ball stage, 235 deg. F. remove from range, add milk and vanilla. This can be kept in a closed jar in refrigerator as long as desired. Butterscotch Snaps 1 c butter 2 c brown sugar 3 c flour 3 tsp baking powder 1-4 tsp salt 2 eggs 1 tsp vanilla 1 c chopped nuts Melt butter, add sugar and cook slowly until well blended. Allow to cool. Combine eggs, vanilla with butter mixture. Add dry ingredients and beat well. Pack in tray and place in refrigerator to chill. Cut in thin slices as needed. Place on greased cookie sheet and bake in 400° oven 8 to 10 minutes.
