In a ceremony characterized by beauty and dignity, Miss Geneva Adele Robertson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Goff, pastor of the bride, officiated, using the ring ceremony.

The interior of the church was a scene of impressive and rare beauty. Tall white floor standards held masses of white gladioli, asters and graceful fronds of fern, and seven-branched candelabra entwined with ivy held lighted Cathedral tapers. The rostrum was banked with native greenery and the choir rail was entwined with garlands of ivy. Family pews were marked with clusters of gladioli and fern caught with bows of white satin ribbon.

Prior to the ceremony a program of nuptial music was rendered by Mr. Russell Roebuck, pianist. Mr. Roebuck played, "Ah Sweet Mystery of Life," "I Love You Truly," "Indian Love Call," and "Poeme." Prior to the entrance of the bride and bridegroom, a trio, including Misses Marjorie Grey Dunn, Catherine Manning and Elizabeth Parker sang "Because." The traditional Bridal Chorus from Lohengrin was used for the processional and Mendelssohn's Wedding March for the recessional. During the ceremony, "Liebertraum" was softly played.

The ushers, Mr. Clifton Barber and Mr. Grady Thomas, lighted the candles. There were no attendants, the couple entered the church together.

The bride was a picture of loveliness in a dress of soldier blue chalk crepe fashioned with fitted bodice, ribbon girdle, bracelet sleeves and new knife pleated skirt. Her hat was an off-the-face felt with lace veil. She wore white gloves and her other accessories were black. Her flowers were an exquisite shoulder corsage of white roses, asters and fever few tied with white satin ribbons. She wore as her only ornament, a single strand of pearls, a gift of the bridegroom.

Mrs. Robertson, mother of the bride, was attired in navy crepe with navy and white accessories and her corsage was of white gladioli and fever few. She is a descendant of Henry Abbott, who was elected a delegate to the Provincial Congress at Halifax in 1776 to frame a Constitution for the State of North Carolina. She is a great, great granddaughter of Abner and Courtney Abbott Williams, who were prominent pioneer settlers in this section of the State. For the past two years she has been assistant cashier in the Belk-Tyler store in Williamston.

Mr. Edwards is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Edwards, Sr., of Williamston, and at the present time holds a position with the Pender Stores in Williamston.

Farmer Will Be Protected In Increased Production
The U. S. Department of Agriculture has set up facilities for buying and moving to consumers all emergency foods produced under the food-for-freedom program next year, says Dean I. O. Schaub of State College. The department will continue to support prices of all needed food commodities except beef on the basis of at least 85 per cent of parity prices. The floor under prices will be continued at least through June, 1943, and precaution will be observed to prevent price drops after that time.
