Profits were apportioned as follows: Martin County, \$5,377.20; State of North Carolina, \$3,393.71; reserve for law enforcement, \$746.83; Town of Williamston, \$722.56; Town of Robersonville, \$398.30; Town of Oak City, \$122.80; and Town of Jamesville, \$100.65. The profits apportioned include \$349.91 discounts earned by the liquor board itself.

The total operating expenses of \$3,942.68 were chargeable to the stores, as follows: Williamston, \$1,722.56; Robersonville, \$1,242.60; Oak City, \$499.04; and Jamesville, \$478.48. Moscow Defense Is Again Threatened By New Nazi Drive

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apparently scored successes when General Maxime Weygand was ousted as commander of the French army in Africa. The dismissal of the General who had fought closer Vichy-German collaboration but who remained loyal to old Marshal Petain, is believed to be the first major step in a move to line France up with Hitler and have the French fleet turned over to Hitler. It is now considered likely that this country will break off relations with the German-pressed but still yellow government of Petain at Vichy.

Petain and the Hitler inspired Admiral Darlan are to meet Goering and Hitler next week for what may be a final and complete sell-out of French liberty.

Apparently the Japanese-American conference in Washington is not progressing very successfully. Japanese spokesman said today that Japan is preparing to continue its aggressive policy, and Washington is said to have informed the Japanese "peace-or-war" mission that Japan will either have to halt aggression and get raw materials or make a drive and suffer the consequences. Japanese newspapers today were leaning toward the side of peace when they declared that Japan's aim was only to get raw materials.

Speaking at the launching of the new battleship, "Indiana" in Newport News this morning, Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox said there were no troubles ahead, and that it could not be determined how soon America would be forced into action. There was a report today stating that the 34th Regiment was being recalled from the Carolina maneuvers with instructions to report to Fort Jackson where they will be equipped for foreign service.

This Week In Defense

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at present are averaging \$1,750,000 a month but "to win this struggle with reasonable speed and certainty" the country must spend approximately \$3,500,000,000 a month on defense. OPM Associate Director Hillman announced some plants are working 160 hours a week with four 40-hour shifts but "this operation can and should be expanded." Three special trains sponsored by the OPM Contract Distribution Division have left Washington on a 40-day tour of 79 cities. The trains are carrying samples of needed defense parts to show manufacturers and facilitate the contract distribution program.

President Roosevelt in a letter to Chairman Doughton of the House Ways and Means Committee, said additional taxes are needed to absorb purchasing power and "prevent a further sharp increase in the cost of living." The Senate passed and returned to the House for concurrence in amendments to a bill to "freeze" rents in the District of Columbia as of January 1, 1941. Price Administrator Henderson announced executive sales engineers with extensive experience in the industrial machinery field are needed in the OPA. Mr. Henderson also announced temporary stabilization of prices of a large variety of builders hardware and of rugs and carpets. He asked manufacturers of metal office furniture not to raise prices above the levels of November 6th when the OPM curtailed their production.

Priorities
Priorities Director Nelson began collection of month-by-month estimates of requirements for critical materials from all industries as a step toward eventual allocation of all critical materials; both to defense and non-defense industries. He said such a program to apply first to steel, copper, aluminum, rubber and chemicals—might be put into effect within three months. Mr. Nelson "froze" all stocks of magnesium and allocated such stocks to defense orders only. He ordered production of light trucks for civilian use in January, 1942, cut 40 per cent below the output for January of this year.

Conservation of Materials
Associate Price Administrator Elliott announced "The Consumer's Pledge for Total Defense," which calls for elimination of waste and careful buying. She said business and civic organizations, the Boy Scouts, retail merchants, church groups, trade unions and women's organizations are cooperating to make copies of the pledge available to America's 30,000,000 homes. The OPM and OPA asked stove manufacturers to eliminate steel coverlids for domestic cooking ranges by December 15th. The agencies estimated the change would save 2,500 tons of steel in 1942.

Large Truck Turns Over On Highway

A large truck, owned by Blount-Harvey Company of Greenville, turned completely over near the home of Mr. C. D. Jenkins near Robersonville on Highway 64 last Monday night. The truck was loaded with peanuts and was operated by LeRoy Williams. The driver escaped without injury and the truck was only slightly damaged.
