HINTS FOR HOMEMAKERS

HOW IS YOUR "VICTORY" GARDEN DOING?
Is your "Victory" garden showing great signs of producing those foods needed to provide health and happiness. Food is a great weapon and will help win the war, not only for our own people, but for the starving population of Europe. Throughout the summer months your "Victory" garden will help release millions of cans of commercially canned foods for relief of the undernourished families of adults and children—in England, in France, in Norway and in many other countries—across the ocean.

Growing food is not a showy job and requires a lot of hard labor but it is well worth our efforts when we see such dishes as these grace our tables and think "I have helped my fellow human beings in the starving countries."

The vegetable is a very royal person and should be treated so, as he gives us our daily health protection through vitamins and minerals. Cook them in as little water as possible in as short a time as possible without peaking or stirring. You will be building your families' health, thus contributing to the health of the nation.

Spanish Carrots
2 bunches carrots
1-2 clove garlic
2 tsp butter or margerine
3-4 tsp salt
1-8 tsp black pepper
1 can (4 oz.) pimientos
1 tsp chili sauce
Cook carrots until tender. Either cut into small pieces or put through ricer. Cook garlic in butter for three minutes. Remove garlic and add carrots, salt, pepper, chopped pimientos and chili sauce. Heat thoroughly and serve. Serves 6. A good source of vitamin A.

Beets in Lemon Sauce
2 1-2 cups cooked sliced beets
1-2 cup corn sirup
1 tsp corn starch
1-2 tsp salt
2 tsp butter
1-4 cup lemon juice
1 tsp grated lemon rind
1-2 cup juice drained from beets
Peel, slice and cook beets in small amount of water. Drain beets, and reserve the liquid. Place sirup, corn starch and salt in a saucepan, and mix well. Add the juice drained from the beets and stir blending thoroughly. Cook over low heat stirring constantly until the mixture boils and becomes clear and thick. Remove from heat and stir in butter, lemon juice and rind. Add drained beets and simmer 10 minutes to blend the flavors. Serves 4 to 5.

Plantation Pie
1 1-2 cups cooked lima beans or pesa
1 cup cooked wax beans
1 1-2 cups cooked carrots
1 tsp grated onion
1-2 tsp paprika
3 cups medium white sauce
Peanut butter crust
4 tsp chopped bacon
Combine vegetables and seasonings with white sauce, pour into well greased 1 1-2 qt. casserole. Make peanut butter crust: Using 4 tsp. peanut butter in place of shortening, make standard biscuit dough—calling for 1 1-2 cups flour. Roll out about 1 1-2 inch thick to fit casserole and place on vegetable mixture; gash top; sprinkle with bacon. Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 20 to 25 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

Beans Turque
1 lb. green beans
3 tsp chopped onion
1 clove garlic, mashed
2 tsp cooking oil
1 large tomato or 1-2 cup tomato juice
1 tsp white wine, optional
1 tsp chopped green pepper
1 tsp chopped parsley
1-4 tsp powdered marjoram
1-8 tsp cinnamon
1-8 tsp nutmeg
1-8 tsp allspice
1-2 tsp salt
Clean and cut beans diagonally; coo kuntil tender. Meanwhile cook onion and garlic in oil over low heat for 5 minutes. Add tomato peeled and cut in pieces (or tomato juice), wine and seasonings. Simmer 10 minutes. Stir in cooked beans, cover, simmer 5 minutes longer. Serves four.
