Staton proposed that all go ahead and hunt as usual this year, but the defendants, apparently looking to the future, rejected the proposal. Staton maintained at the hearing that he was the Broad Creek Hunting Club, that it had no members, and certainly not the defendants named.

Judge Thompson mentioned a possible course of action when he tentatively suggested that possibly three days could be set aside each week for the defendants and three for the plaintiff, the jurist explaining that it as unlawful to hunt on Sunday. A motion to remove the case to this county for trial next week was rejected, the court intimating that the plaintiff could not get a fair trial in Martin. If no agreement is reached, the case will likely be called for trial in the Bertie County Superior Court next February.


**Case Visit County**


