Welfare Department Budget Approved by County Authorities

Other Business Handled By Comn.issioners in Regular Session Monday

Meeting in regular session here yesterday, the Martin County Commissioners approved the 1945-46 public welfare department budget, drew a jury for the June court, issued a few tax relief orders and handled a few other items of business. The meeting, attended by all five of the commissioners, Messrs. Joshua L. Coltrain, R .L. Perry, John Henry Edwards, C. Abram Roberson and R. A. Haislip, lasted until well in the

The new welfare budget, formally approved by the commissioners subject to final adoption by the State Department, calls for a county appropriation of \$27,229.64 for the 1945-46 fiscal year, the estimates exceeding the current fiscal year figures by approximately \$3,457. The administration costs are estimated at \$9,430.00, the county to appropriate \$4,830 of this amount and the State and federal governments the remainder. Salaries were increased from \$7,320 to \$7,980, and travel allowances were jumped from \$1,250 to \$1,450. General expenses, including hospitalization and direct or general relief will cost, according to the new estimate, \$6,475, or about \$780 more than it did for the 1944-45 fiscal year. The public assistance program will cost \$14,024.64 or about \$2,108.64 more than it did a year

The commissioners donated \$250 to the Salvation Army for the care of wayward girls in its home at Durham. It was pointed out that twenty young Martin County girls had been cared for in the home in the past two or three years.

A request was made to the State Highway Commission for the improvement of a community road in Jamesville Township, known as the Ange or Ward and Glade Road, beginning at Lonnie Ange's and running south via D. H. Padgett's to the Gurganus place, a distance of one mile. The road, it was pointed out, was once a public road.

Dennis Mayo Harrison, Martin County young man, died on Luzon island in the Philippines on March 30, 1945, of wounds received in action the same day, his brother, Ernest Harrison, RFD 2, Williamston, was advised by the War Department yesterday afternoon. No details were offered in the message. Relatives, two weeks ago today, received a message from the War Department stating that the young man had been seriously wounded.

The expected announcement by President Harry S. Truman proclaiming victory in Europe will be followed by church and prayer servces throughout the county, according to reports of pre-arranged schedules received here. No big celebration is planned, and it is believed that church services, scheduled for thirty minutes after the proclamation is heard, will be largely at-

According to pre-arranged plans for the observance of the German surrender, the local fire siren will be sounded and church bells will ring. Two long blasts on the fire siren will be heard. Local merchants and other businesses have agreed to suspend activities for the remainder of the day, but heavy industry supporting the war effort is being asked to continue operations with the possible exception of a few minutes spent in giving humble thanks for victory in Europe and prayer for peace in the Pacific.

The service of thanksgiving and prayers for peace in the Pacific will e held in the Memorial Baptist Church. Rev. John L. Goff will be in charge of the service and Dr. W R. Burrell will deliver the message. should the crowd overflow the Baptist Church, a service will be held in the Christian Church where Rev. Jos. Huske will be in charge and where Rev. B. T. Hurley will deliv-

A special program for the religious service, planned by the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, will be followed, and the meeting will last hardly more than half or three-quarters of an hour.
