State College Hints For Farm Homes

Time-saving soak: Many dishes and pans used in getting mee! will wash more quickly and easily if they are filled with water immediately after using and allowed to soak until washed. A cold-water soak is recommended for loosening starchy foods, like dough or cereal, and also for eggs and milk. A hot-water soak is best for utensils which have held sugary foods like sirup or icing because sugar dissolves faster in hot than in cold water.

Greasy utensils should have all possible grease removed—to save for cooking use later or salvage—and then should be wiped out with paper and allowed to soak in hot water containing a little baking soda.

A time-saving way to keep silverware bright is to have a little aluminum pan filled with hot soda water near the dishpan and put into it any silver, tarnished with egg or other food.

Garden peas, when just at the right stage for eating, will be sweeter if picked in the morning than at the end of the day. Vegetables mature rapidly in the heat of the day and, as they mature, become less sweet and more starchy. Peas gathered first thing in the morning, therefore, are sweeter as well as fresh and more tender than if left until later in the day.

"Going Places?" Packing with tissue paper helps to ward off wrinkles. Unpack clothes as soon as possible. If fabrics are well chosen, they will be smooth in a few hours.
