Higher Quality Gas To Be Offered Here

Local agents of the Sinclair Refining company have been advised that gasoline of better than prewar quality has been started to local motorists from Sinclair Refineries.

N. C. Green, local agent, says Sinclair Refineries are shipping 75 octane Sinclair H-C housebrand gaso-

line and 80 octane premium grade. Wartime restrictions have limited Housebrand to 70 octane and premium gasoline to 76 octane. Steps are also being taken to raise through blending operations, the octane value of the gasoline now in storage so as to make available to the consumer prewar quality immediately.

Mr. Green says that it should take but a few days to restore prewar quality in the gasoline. "We are anxious to give the motorist this new quality merchandise as soon as possible," he added.
