The South Can Produce

INFORMATIVE and more than a little heartening are the figures disclosed by T. M. Healy on the wartime carloadings of freight in the Southeast. Mr. Healy, district manager of the car service division of the Association of American Railroads, the Association of Shippers' Advisory Board here that "During the past few years industry and transportation in the Southeast, through co-operative energy, have successfully penetrated an entirely new era and fulfilled all assignments."

The figures cited by Mr. Healy speak themselves the achievement of the region, but they do more than that. They point to an industrial direction which the Southeast may find it economically feasible to continue along.

For example, the loading of canned goods in the Southeast in 1939 was only 8,886 cars. But the needs of fighting forces and others forced the region to demonstrate that it could increase production of canned goods sharply. By 1944, expansion of the industry in the Southeast brought the total loadings to 23,303 cars, and last year they rose to 44,295. Canning could prove a highly profitable field for Georgia if farmers would attempt to grow products properly for that purpose.

The pulp and paper industry has made strides in seven-league boots in recent years. There is no reason why it should not continue to do so.


Loadings of pulp, paper and products averaged 93,831 cars a year in the Southeast during the four war years; in 1939, the loadings totaled only 77,390.

Carloadings of grain and grain products in the region rose from 56,029 cars in 1939 to 81,184 in 1944.

The Southeast has evidenced eloquently its ability to produce.

And lest it be overlooked, let us also give due credit to the railroads of the region for an outstanding wartime performance. The face of many handicaps. The railroads, too, have learned that they can turn out better than a fair to middling job.
