Several Martin County Young Men Served In Battles With The Thirtieth

Of the Old Hickory

(Continued from last issue) (The story below reviews the lorious part the Thirtieth (Old Hickory) Division had in winning World War II. Since several Martin County boys were in the Division, the record most certainly will be read with interest in this county.) The fourth in the series of installnents fellows:

The 30th's doughboys who had covred their trails from the beaches of Normandy with great glory and redit to the Queen of Battles-the Infantry-were next selected as the ivision that was to smash the most neavily manned section of Germany's aunted west wall.

The battle for the forced entry into Germany started on October 2, along a narrow front extending between

Marienberg and Rimberg, north of he historic city of Aachen. It was savagely vicious struggle from the very start. The Germans now were fgihting on their own soil for the protection of their homes and their families and they were waging the battle from concrete fortresses whose walls ranged to eight feet in thickness. They had set up what they believed to be the perfect defense of the homeland and were instructed to fight or be shot by their own SS roops. That was the type of forhidable opposition faced by the 30th. For this gigantic task the doughoys were to be given the best possible assistance from all supporting inits. Twenty-six battalions of ar-


