Washington.-Divorces are still on the increase in several states of the of Christ will convene with the First nation, but, according to figures of the Bureau of the Census, they have a long way to go to offset a recent boom in the matrimonial field.

During 1945, the Bureau said, 10.8 percent more marriage licenses were issued in cities of 100,000 inhabitants or more than during 1944. Over a seven-year period this figure was topped only once—in 1942, the peak year in marriages.

Although the 1945 total of 568,713 permits was 4.4 percent lower than that for 1942, when 594,908 permits were issued, it was 39.1 percent higher than the estimated total for 1939, with 408,989 permits. Changes in the nation ranged from an increase of 42 percent in Charlotte, N. C., to a decrease of 18.6 percent in Tampa, Fla. The number of permits is viewed only as an approximation of the number of marriages performed.
